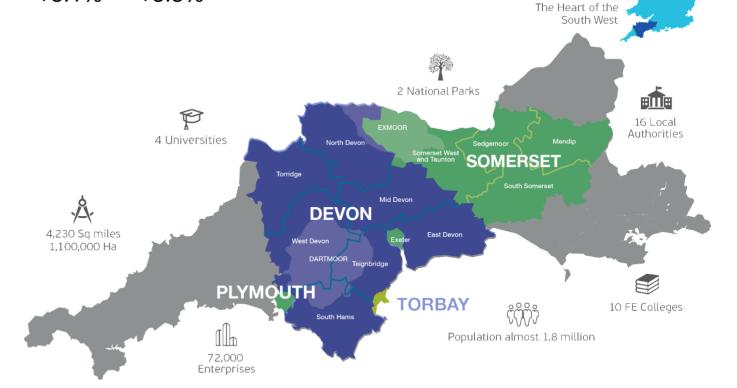

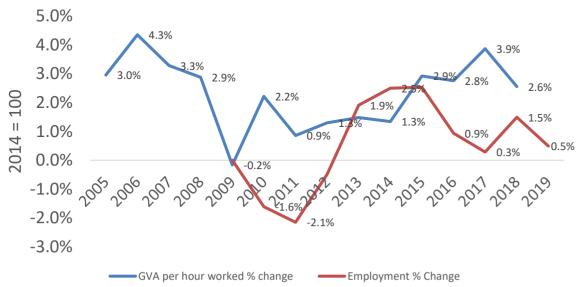
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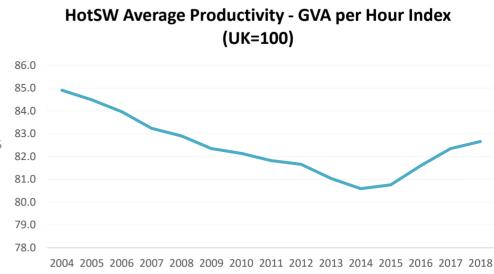
- At headline level productivity growth appears positive vs UK average
- But not quite as straightforward!

... but underlying structural challenges

Long-standing productivity gap remains







- Strong employment growth to mid-2010s; plateaued as market tightened
- YoY productivity growth improved as jobs growth slowed from mid-2010s
 - BUT remains below early
 2000s: <2%per yr vs 3-5%per yr

- Overall productivity gap started to close in recent years
 - BUT remains below early 2000s level

... and level is still behind early 2000s

2014 Strategic Economic Plan

- By 2030, there is distinctive legacy of 'better jobs' from the investment in Hinkley, marine and other transformational assets
- By 2030, proportion of businesses in knowledge economy has increased
- By 2030 there is a ratio of high/medium tech businesses matching regional
- By 2020, HOTSW is recognised as one of the best places in the UK to start and grow a small business
- 2020 the natural capital of the HoTSW area is enhanced and of increasing value to businesses and communities.

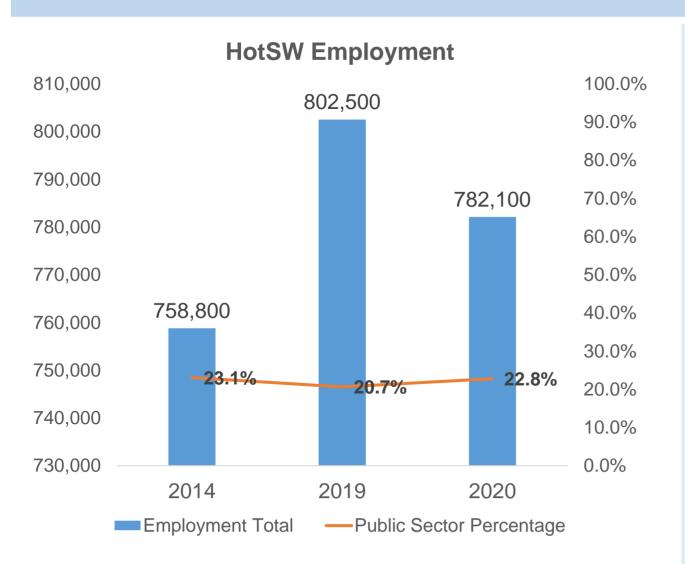

Jobs: by 2020 create an extra 50,000 jobs





Future challenges: jobs growth slowed by pandemic making achievement to 2025 more stretching, though recovery is accelerating

- ✓ Jobs growth +44,500 from 2014-2019, but -20,400 from 2019-2020.
- Meanwhile, public sector employment stable/ decreased slightly.

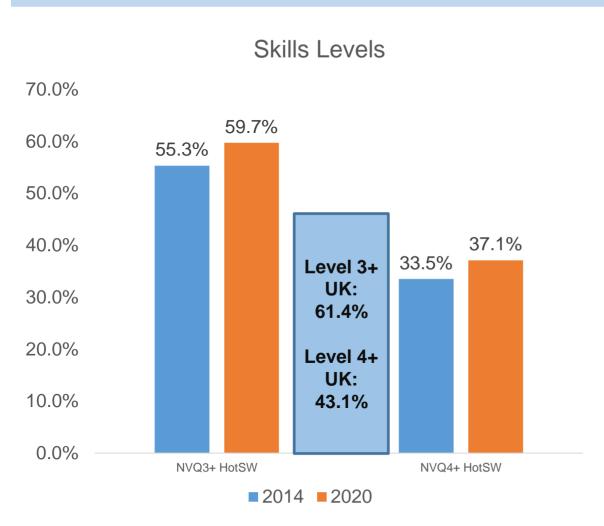

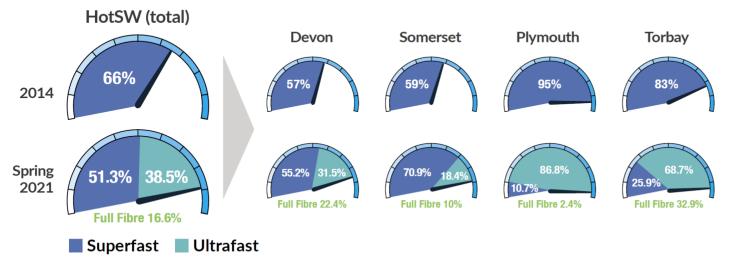

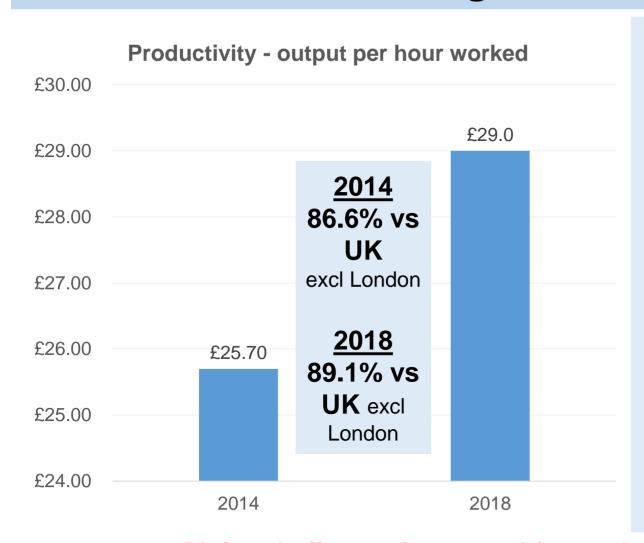
- 9,516 new homes connected to fibre (Growth Deal)

- Digital Skills Partnership: Raising Digital engagement at Key Stage 3: 1000+ pupils benefitted, Train4Tomorrow 890 people complete 12-week digital and technical bootcamps, Skillslab: 50 mature lerners supported, Bounce Back Digital May-Oct supporting businesses' transition to digital: 50+ workshops attended by 900 businesses

Productivity: by 2030, close productivity gap with national average





- √ +12.6% vs 9.8% UK (+9.7% UK less London)
- Recent growth, but gap remains (note data only to 2018)

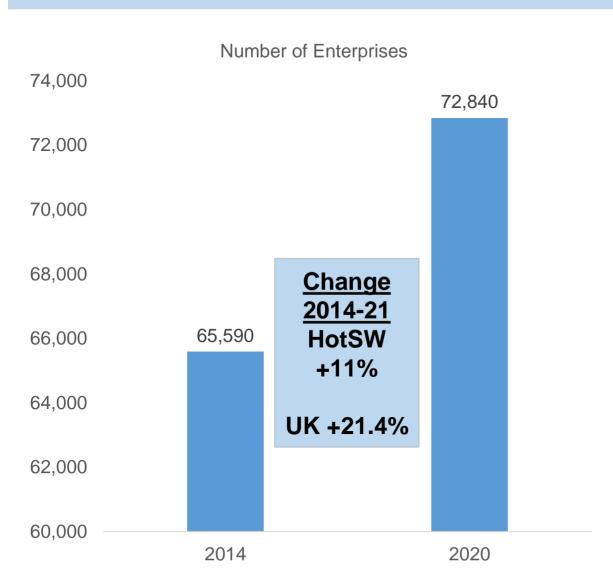

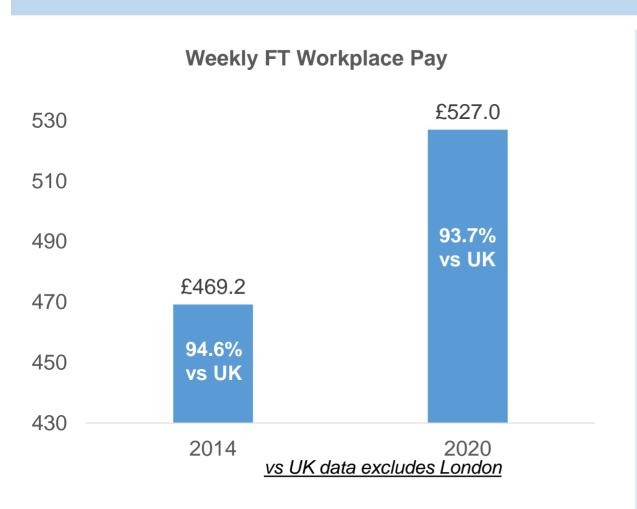

Wages By 2030, increase wages to match national average



X Growth in wages but gap remains compared to national average

Wage gap a combination of Productivity gap & type of work

- proportion of public sector employment remains higher in some areas (Devon & Plymouth) than nationally: lower wage growth
- lower proportion in higher productivity sectors
- lower growth in FT work vs.
 national rate

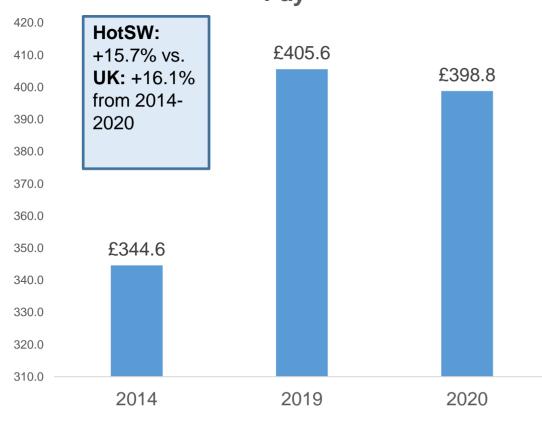
Future challenges: increase the opportunities for and access to better paid jobs

Lowest 25% Median Weekly Resident Pay



- ✓ Lower paid wage growth stronger than national rate until 2020
- Impacts of COVID-19 have supressed wage growth for lower paid workers

Key focus of Build Back Better

- Employment growth, though pandemic taken its toll.
- Productivity continuing to rise, though gap remains.
- Continued wage growth, but not for lowest earners.
- Housing delivery remains on track.
- Broadband coverage.
